

Sunday 19 May is Pentecost Sunday when we will be welcoming Bishop Adam, the new*ish* Bishop of Bradwell, for his first visit to our parish.

As it is the third Sunday of the month when we have a group service for all three churches Bishop Adam will preside at our Parish Eucharist which will be held at St Mary's Ramsden Bellhouse, then we will go to St Margaret's Downham for a buffet lunch.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting (AGM)

Churches, like all charities, are required to hold an annual general meeting where trustees are elected and the officers present their reports. As mentioned in last month's edition of *The Herald*, the first AGM of the new combined parish of Downham with South Hanningfield and Ramsden Bellhouse will take place on 29 April at 7.00pm in St Margaret's church, Downham. We will be electing a brand new Parochial Church Council who are the charitable trustees and have the same legal status as directors of a limited company. To be a member of the PCC you need to be an actual communicant member of the Church of England and have been on the parish's electoral roll for a minimum of six months. You cannot be a member of a PCC if you have been debarred from acting as a company director. We are currently seeking nominations as PCC members. If you are qualified and wish to put your name forward for election please contact Mike Roome whose details may be found on the inside front cover

From the ministry team

April Fool's?

No one really knows the origin of April Fool's Day, though it is 'celebrated' (if that is the right word) across the world. In the UK, the custom dates back to at least 1698; a British Newspaper (Dawk's newsletter) reported several people going to the Tower of London to "see the lions washed" - a popular prank that continued into the 18th and 19th Centuries.

This year April Fool's day falls on the Bank Holiday Easter Monday, the day after we celebrate Jesus' rising from the dead. Peter and John certainly thought that Mary Magdalene had somehow been tricked when, early in the morning, three days after Jesus was crucified and buried in a tomb, she came and told them that the heavy stone had been rolled away from the entrance of

the tomb; until they went and investigated themselves. Mary Magdalene must have thought someone was playing a cruel trick or had even stolen Jesus' body, until she heard her name, turned and saw Jesus himself - risen from the dead and much alive.

Over the next two thousand years more and more people have believed that Jesus really did rise from the dead - defeating death once and for all for everyone. On Easter morning, and every Sunday morning, we remember, celebrate, and give thanks in our church services. We give thanks that in Jesus' death there is forgiveness for all our wrongdoings, and in his resurrection the assurance that we will never be separated from the love God has for each one of us.

It still may be quite a difficult thing to believe - that Jesus, the Son of God, died for us and rose from the dead, but perhaps, as we see the April Fool Pranks on the news, that may make us smile and are quickly forgotten, what if the resurrection of Jesus - that around 2 billion people in the world still believe in today - is actually true? What would that mean to you if it were?

St George of the Golden Legend

We celebrate St George, patron saint of England, on 23 April.

The Saint of an English Army before he was Patron Saint of England, St George may have been a soldier, but he was no Englishman. Some stories say that he was an officer in the Roman army under Diocletian, who refused to abandon his faith during the Terror, and was martyred at Lydda in Palestine about the year 300 AD - supposedly on 23 April. Over the years St George became the example of a Christian fighting-man, a powerful helper against evil powers affecting individual lives. He was the soldier-hero of the Middle Ages, of whom remarkable deeds were reported.

In the Golden Legend of the 13th century, Jacobus de Voragine gave St George a handsome write-up. The story runs thus:

One day, St George rode up to the heathen city of Sylene in Lybya where he found the citizens in great distress. A neighbouring dragon had forced them to surrender two sheep each day for its dinner, and when the sheep gave out, two of their children; and now they were about to sacrifice the King's daughter, dressed as if for her wedding. St George encountered the little party by a stagnant lake, where the dragon lived, and persuaded the sobbing Princess to tell him why she was so miserable. At that moment the dragon appeared, looking inexpressibly revolting. St George charged forwards and drove his

spear into the dragon's gaping mouth. To everyone's amazement, he tumbled the monster over and over.

Then St George borrowed the Princess's girdle, tied it round the dragon's neck, and persuaded her to lead it back to Sylene herself. The sight of her approaching with the befuddled dragon on its makeshift lead emptied the town. When the inhabitants timidly crept back, St George promised to behead the dragon if they would all believe in Jesus Christ and be baptised.

It was a most effective form of evangelism, for everybody said 'yes' at once. So, 15,000 people were baptised, and four carts were commissioned to remove the dragon's body.

St George thus became a symbol of the war against evil, and he is usually portrayed trampling the dragon of sin under his horse's hoofs. The Crusaders had a vision of him helping them against the Saracens at Antioch, during the first Crusade, and so brought the story of St George back with them from Palestine. Presently England put herself under the protection of the Saint. His day was declared a holiday in 1222. A red cross on a white field is the flag of St George.



Easter Celebration at Downham Church of England Primary School

At Downham Church of England Primary School, we have been preparing for Easter throughout this half-term, not least with our Easter Celebration at Chelmsford Cathedral on Monday 11 March. It was truly wonderful to see the cathedral so full of our school families and friends. Both the children and school staff had worked incredibly hard to prepare for this special event.

For me, like many in our school community, our Easter Celebration has been a highlight of the school calendar for several years now. I will always remember the heaviness of heart I felt when we had to cancel the celebration just before the school closed for the first Covid lockdown in 2020. It felt as if the world was tilting out of control and yet, even then, the Easter message of hope and love could not be quenched. As a school community, we rallied together on the front playground and sang our special Easter songs.

This year, at the cathedral, each class told a different part of Easter story. The youngest children started the retelling with a song about Palm Sunday and the service culminated with the Year 6 children reflecting upon Easter Sunday and Jesus' resurrection. In between, the Year 1-5 classes shared about the Last Supper, Jesus praying in the Garden of Gethsemane and his subsequent arrest, Peter's denial and Jesus' crucifixion.

Our Easter Celebration was a great reminder of God's great love as demonstrated through the cross and Jesus' sacrifice to bring about reconciliation between God and humans. We remembered that death has indeed lost its sting and that Jesus' resurrection demonstrates his victory over death and gives us hope and assurance of better things to come.

As a school, we wish everyone in our local community an Easter season filled with love, hope and peace.

All in the month of April

It was:

300 years ago, on 7 April 1724 that the German composer Johann Sebastian Bach's St John Passion was performed for the first time, at a church in Leipzig.

Also 300 years ago, on 22 April 1724 that Immanuel Kant, the German philosopher was born. One of the leading philosophers during the Age of Enlightenment.

200 years ago, on 19 April 1824 that Lord Byron died. One of the greatest British poets and a leading figure in the Romantic movement, he died of sepsis/fever while fighting for Greek independence from the Ottoman Empire. Aged 36.

175 years ago, on 10 April 1849 that American mechanic Walter Hunt was granted a US patent for his invention of the safety pin. He immediately sold the rights for \$400, which is about \$12,000 today. The company he sold it to

made millions from it.

150 years ago, on 5 April 1874 that Johann Strauss II's operetta Die Fledermaus was performed for the first time, in Vienna.

125 years ago, on 29 April 1899 that Duke Ellington, American jazz/swing pianist, composer and orchestra leader, was born.

100 years ago, on 17 April 1924 that Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Studios (MGM) was founded when Metro Pictures, Goldwyn Pictures and Louis B Mayer Pictures merged.

Also 100 years ago, on 23 April 1924 that the British Empire Exhibition opened in Wembley, London.

90 years ago, on 3 April 1934 that British inventor Percy Shaw patented the Cat's Eye reflective road stud. He set up a company to manufacture them in 1935 and in 1937 he was awarded a government contract to mass produce them for national use.

75 years ago, on 4 April 1949 that the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO) was founded.

Also 75 years ago, on 7 April 1949 that the Rodgers and Hammerstein musical South Pacific was opened in Broadway.

70 years ago, on 7 April 1954 that in a news conference about Communism in Indochina, US President Dwight D Eisenhower explained his 'domino theory'. He said that if one country in a region came under the influence of Communism, then the countries surrounding it would follow. He and later presidential administrations have always believed this.

Also 70 years ago, on 26 April 1954 that the Soviet Union transferred Crimea from Russia to Ukraine. In 2014 Russia annexed Crimea, but it is not recognised internationally, and a number of sanctions were imposed on Russia as a result.

65 years ago, on 9 April 1959 that Frank Lloyd Wright, American architect and writer, died. Regarded as 'the greatest American architect of all time.'

60 years ago, on 15 April 1964 that twelve men convicted of carrying out the Great Train Robbery in England in August of 1963 were jailed for a total of 307 years. They were given some of the longest sentences in British criminal history.

50 years ago, on 6 April 1974 that the Swedish pop group ABBA won the Eurovision Song Contest with their song Waterloo. It was the first time that Sweden won the contest. ABBA went on to be one of the most successful groups in music history.

40 years ago, on 17 April 1984 that British police officer Yvonne Fletcher was shot dead during a demonstration outside the Libyan Embassy in London.

This led to an 11-day siege by the police.

30 years ago, on 6 April 1994 that the Rwandan genocide began, when a plane carrying Rwandan president Juvenal Habyarimana and Burundian president Cyprien Ntaryamira was shot down by extremists. Civil war broke out the following day, and between 500,000 and one million people were massacred during the next 100 days.

Also 30 years ago, on 26 April 1994 that the first post-apartheid multiracial elections were held in South Africa, with 18 million blacks eligible to vote for the first time. Nelson Mandela was elected president, and took office on 10 May.

25 years ago, on 5 April 1999 that Libya handed over to the United Nations two suspects in the 1988 bombing of Pan Am Flight 103 over Lockerbie. They were taken to the Netherlands to face trial. One was found guilty, and sentenced to life imprisonment, only to be released in 2009 because he was dying of cancer. The other suspect was acquitted.

20 years ago, on 1 April 2004 that Google launched its free email service, Gmail.

10 years ago, on 14 April 2014 that the Boko Haram Islamic terrorist group kidnapped 276 female students from the Government Girls Secondary School in Chibok, Nigeria. Some of the girls escaped, some were rescued, or have been reported dead. But over 100 are still missing, fate unknown.

Appreciating Johann Sebastian Bach

Three hundred years ago, on 7 April 1724, the German composer Johann Sebastian Bach's St John Passion was performed for the first time, at a church in Leipzig.

It was put on as part of Good Friday Vespers at St Nicholas Church, having been transferred from St Thomas at the last moment by the music council. Bach, who had just turned 39, agreed to the move, while pointing out that the booklet had already been printed, there was no room immediately available for the musicians, and the harpsichord needed some repair. These problems were overcome.

Bach was already highly regarded, but primarily as a harpsichordist and organ expert. Later seen as one of the best composers of all time – renowned for such works as the Brandenburg Concertos and his Mass in B Minor – he was one of a large family of north German musicians. He is widely praised as a great synthesiser of styles and traditions.

The St John Passion, written during his first year as director of church music in Leipzig, was designed to be used as part of a church service. It follows John

18 and 19 in the Luther Bible, but the writer of the libretto is not known. A possible earlier Passion, written in Weimar, is lost.

Nowadays the St John Passion is heard mainly in the 1739–1749 version, which was never performed in Bach's lifetime, though he made many revisions to the original before his death.

Prayer Walking in our community

Prayer walking is just what it sounds. You pray as you walk.

What is the point? Think of it as stepping out as God's children, to intercede for those who are living in your community. Be intentional about praying for God's blessings on what you see and feel.

Simply praying: "Your Kingdom come, your will be done..." is an excellent start.

Prayer walking is NOT about being seen to be praying, you are not doing it to 'show off'. It is about seeing your neighbourhood with compassion, and then praying for God's mercy and blessing to be upon it.

So, as you go along, you can pray quietly, or in silence. If you do want to pray out loud, take a friend along, so that it will seem merely as if you are chatting. In fact, when you do a prayer walk, it is best not to do it alone. Always try and go with someone else. After all, Jesus sent His disciples out in pairs.

On your prayer walk, try and be aware of what God is saying to you as you move around the community. As the former Archbishop of York, Lord Sentamu, once advised: "If any Bible verses pop into your head or if you have any pictures, visions or words of knowledge, turn these into prayer."

At the end of the prayer walk, share with others what you prayed for, and heard from God. Write any impressions down, so you can keep track of how you have prayed for your area.

Again, to quote Lord Sentamu, "If you feel that God has highlighted specific needs or challenges, think about how to take action. Could you or the church be part of God's solution practically, as well as prayerfully?"

With Annual General Meetings at church in mind...

It was not an accident that 17 of the 36 parables of our Lord had to do with property and stewardship.
