

The Prince of Peace

A few years ago I had the opportunity to go to the Holy Land. It was January, and it was cold, wet, and windy! Some of the sites we visited were in Israel; others in the West Bank - including Bethlehem and the Church of the Nativity. It was stunningly beautiful, and the Christmas tree in the square outside made it particularly festive. Yet not too far from the Church of the Nativity is 'The Wall' - the large, imposing, concrete wall, that separates The West Bank from Israel.

Jesus was born into a land of turbulence, political unrest, and violence. Just next door to the Church of the Nativity is the Church of the Holy Innocents - the church that honours the children who were killed when Herod found out that a 'rival' king had been born there. Jesus stepped right in to the messiness of people - into the tragedy of what humans can inflict on each other.

The chances are that, at some point over the festive period, you will hear Handel's 'Unto us a child is born.' Written in 1741, it has been a pretty firm fixture in the build up to Christmas ever since. Here are the lyrics:

For unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given: And the government shall be upon His shoulder; And His name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The Mighty God, the Everlasting Father,

The Prince of Peace.

It comes from the words of the Prophet Isaiah, in the Old Testament (Isaiah 9:6) - who wrote his prophesies hundreds of years before Jesus' birth. Writing in a time of great uncertainty and upheaval himself, Isaiah writes of a Messiah, a saviour - someone who will show, by example, how we can live in love and peace with one another and with God.

Two thousand years after Jesus' birth, our world is still in desperate need of that peace - not least in the very land where he lived.

He showed us, in his life and teaching, that peace is a costly thing. Costly to ourselves, because it requires us to put the needs of others above our own. It means treating others with love and kindness - especially those whom we may not even like!

We ourselves may not be in a position to solve the crisis currently engulfing the people of Israel and Gaza; we may not be able to stop the war in Ukraine, or indeed any of the other conflicts currently taking place across the world but we can pray. We can pray for world leaders, politicians, military leaders, diplomats, etc., that peace can be found. We can give to charities and

organisations who are helping and supporting those caught up in war and conflicts, and we can pray that, following the example of Jesus, the Prince of Peace, we can, in our own communities, be people of peace to each other this Christmas.

And there were shepherds...

Luke's story of the birth of Jesus is brilliantly told – the angel's visit to Mary to tell her she would be mother of the long-promised Messiah, the old priest in the Temple told by another angel that his wife would have a son to be called 'John', who would prepare the people of Israel for that event, and then Mary and Joseph making the 60 mile journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem, as required by the Roman census. When they got there, no room at the inn, and they settled instead for a convenient stable, where Mary gave birth to a boy child.

Suddenly, Luke changes the tone. 'And there were shepherds ...' – that's what he actually wrote, just like that. 'And there were shepherds', doing exactly what shepherds do, looking after their flocks by night. But this night was different: yet another angelic message – a call to abandon their sheep and go into Bethlehem to see the baby Messiah. They were given directions and a 'sign' to identify Him. He would be lying in a feeding trough. Well, at least they would recognise that.

And why the shepherds, in this glorious story of our salvation? Because the event needed witnesses, and the chosen witnesses would be this bunch of scruffy, smelly shepherds straight from the sheep-pen. Nothing could speak more eloquently of God's purpose than that. This was not a Saviour for the strong, rich and powerful, but for everybody. The carpenter and his wife guarded the Saviour of the world, and the very first witnesses were not kings or priests but a handful of shabby shepherds.

Happy Christmas from South Hanningfield Village Hall Management Committee

All in the month of December

It was:

800 years ago, on 25 December 1223 that St Francis of Assisi created the first nativity scene, in Greccio, Italy, after visiting Jesus' birthplace in the Holy Land. It proved enormously popular and inspired other communities to stage their own nativity scenes.

250 years ago, on 16 December 1773 that the Boston Tea Party took place in Massachusetts. American patriots boarded ships and threw chests of tea belonging to the British East India Company into Boston Harbour, as a protest against the British tax on tea.

200 years ago, on 23 December 1823 that the poem The Night Before Christmas was first published (anonymously) in the Sentinel newspapers in

Troy, New York. It was written by Clement Clarke Moore.

175 years ago – on 19 December 1848 that Emily Bronte, British novelist and poet, died of tuberculosis, aged 30. Best known for her only novel, Wuthering Heights.

100 years ago, on 6 December 1923 that Ramsay MacDonald became the first Labour Prime Minister. The General Election had resulted in a hung parliament, and the Labour Party had formed a coalition with the Liberal Party.

Also 100 years ago, on 31 December 1923 that the BBC broadcast the chimes of Big Ben for the first time, to welcome in the New Year. The tradition continues to this day.

80 years ago, on 22 December 1943 that Beatrix Potter, children's writer and illustrator, died. She created animal characters including Peter Rabbit, Squirrel Nutkin, Mrs Tiggy-Winkle, Jemima Puddle-Duck, and many more.

75 years ago, on 10 December 1948 that the Universal Declaration of Human Rights was adopted by the United Nations General Assembly.

Also 75 years ago, on 24 December 1948 that the first Midnight Mass to be televised was broadcast from St Patrick's Cathedral in New York City.

70 years ago, on 10 December 1953 that former US Secretary of State George Marshall was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for creating the Marshall Plan. The aid package helped Europe rebuild after WW2.

65 years ago, on 5 December 1958 that Britain's first motorway, the Preston By-pass, was officially opened. (It is now part of the M6 and M55.)

60 years ago, on 21 December 1963 that the Daleks made their first appearance on the British science fiction TV series Doctor Who.

50 years ago, on 21 December 1973 that the Geneva Conference opened in Switzerland, aimed at finding a solution to the Arab-Israeli conflict. No agreement was reached, but Israel signed a military disengagement agreement with both Egypt and Syria in 1974.

40 years ago, on 10 December 1983 that Polish Solidarity leader Lech Walesa was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. (It was accepted by his wife, as he feared he might not be allowed back into Poland if he travelled to Norway to accept it.)

30 years ago, on 10 December 1993 that Monkwearmouth Colliery in Sunderland closed down. It marked the end of more than 800 years of coal mining in the region.

Also 30 years ago, on 30 December 1993 that Israel and the Vatican City agreed to recognise each other and established diplomatic relations.

25 years ago, on 10 December 1998 that the UN General Assembly listed anti-Semitism as a form of racism.

Also 25 years ago, on 10 December 1998 that the Palestine Liberation Organisation voted to remove clauses in its charter that called for Israel's destruction.

20 years ago, on 1 December 2003 that using a handheld mobile phone while driving became illegal in the UK.

Also 20 years ago, on 13 December 2003 that during the Iraq War, former Iraqi President Saddam Hussein was captured by US forces, who found him hiding in a hole at a farmhouse in ad-Dawr, near his hometown of Tikrit.

10 years ago, on 5 December 2013 that Nelson Mandela died. This antiapartheid revolutionary and politician had become President of South Africa 1994-99. He served as President of the African National Congress (ANC) 1991-97. Winner of the 1993 Nobel Peace Prize.

Follow the Star

Jesus' welcoming committee included Eastern scholars who learned about His birth through their study of astrology. I can't help thinking that the arrival of these people at Bethlehem is a link between a very early form of science (albeit mixed in with their own form of religion) and Christian faith. What better way to discover God than to explore the world and follow the evidence wherever it leads? But what exactly was the star of Bethlehem? Scientists have investigated this question over the centuries, coming up with a variety of answers.

First, there is the idea of a supernova: the massively bright explosion caused by a dying star. On rare occasions a supernova can be seen from Earth with the naked eye, remaining visible for several months. We now know that Herod the Great died around 4BC, so the actual date of Jesus' birth must be a little earlier. The supernovae that might match this timing were one in the Andromeda galaxy between March 8BC and September 7BC, and another in the constellation of Capricorn in the Spring of 5BC.

Next, comes a planetary conjunction. The alignment most commonly associated with the star of Bethlehem was between Jupiter and Saturn in the constellation of Pisces in 7BC, but not everyone is sure whether this would be extraordinary enough to be the 'star' mentioned in the Bible.

Finally, the bright astronomical object that drew the Magi could have been a comet. This idea came from Sir Colin Humphreys, Professor of Materials Science at Cambridge University, and Oxford astronomer WG Waddington, who found that a comet was recorded by Chinese astronomers between March and May, 5BC. Humphreys then speculated that the 'no room at the inn' scenario came about because Jesus was born during Passover, and the Magi visited Jesus in May or June.

People interpret the biblical account of Jesus' birth in all sorts of ways, but there's very little argument from serious historians that Jesus of Nazareth actually existed. Whatever the true explanation for the 'star of Bethlehem'

may be, there's plenty of evidence that an astronomical event could have happened at the time of His birth.

I think it makes perfect sense that if God was going to enter His own creation and take on the form of one of His own creatures, it should be marked by a very significant physical event!
